^{Off.} ~~part~~ of the abandoned Fort Assinaboine, Military Reservation Lands (Congress) in 1916 set aside three townships to serve as a home for a roving band of Chippewas and Crees then under the leadership of Chief Rocky Boy. According to the new reservation was called Rocky Boy and its tenants the Rocky Boy Indians. Of the 480 on the official rolls 160 are baptized Catholics sadly in need of religious instruction. Many of the full-bloods are addicted to the worship of spirits and to the superstition of the Indian dance. Nearly all the half-breeds are of the household of the faith.

On the reservation there are 75 children of school age. The Government conducts a day school with accommodations for 45 pupils but the average attendance is 30. The staff is composed of one teacher Mathew V. Buchmann aided by his wife who acts as Matron serving a noon-day meal to the children. Both are practical Catholics and therefore a great help in many ways to the priest.

A Jesuit Father from Havre 25 miles distant visits the reservation once a month to offer up holy Mass in the Government School, to preach the word of God, to administer the Sacraments and to look after the sick. On learning that an incoming protestant minister had secured from the Indian Department an allotment of 80 acres for a "non-sectarian" mission, I applied through the Catholic Indian Bureau for similar recognition and as a consequence 4 acres of land were set aside by the Government for a Catholic Mission site. Both the Government and the Indians expect us to put this land to use. If we are to conserve the faith of the Catholic Indians and win over the pagans some concrete symbol of our intentions must soon be in evidence on this Catholic Mission site.

What is to be done? Our most pressing need is a simple log Chapel. just now my Indians are buried with the assembling - the logs which later they will hew and put in place; but to build this Chapel - and build it we must - will mean an outlay of \$1000. How to get it we don't know: perhaps some of the readers of the "Indian Sentinel" can advise us. Well, we are in a "receptive" mood for ideas, for cash and for articles which can be converted into cash.

A Catholic Chapel on the Rocky Boy Reservation will give prestige to the Catholic faith - it will enable us to surround the sacred mysteries with some degree of dignity and reverence: it will serve as a rallying place for our poor Catholics and with the standard of the Cross in evidence there will be an abiding appeal to the passing pagans to "come and see" and follow Christ their Redeemer.

This Chapel with the sanctuary partitioned off could be used on week-days as a Catholic day school to accommodate 30 or 40 Catholic pupils. With the salary of one Catholic teacher and his wife provided for the Rocky Boy Catholic Mission could be opened in September of this year with Church and School under one roof. He who goes about doing good" pleads for a home among the Rocky Boys. Who will provide it?
