Thanks for check of \$324. Some time ago, I sent several pictures. I hope they all reached their destination.

Of course you are aware of the fact that the medicine men do a great deal of harm "spiritually" among our Indians. I know very well that Fr. Ketcham tried his best to persuade the Indian Commissioners to do something toward curbing their activities. All his efforts proved useless, because it was argued that the medicine men were something like religious ministers etc. But leaving aside the religious question, I say and I am not alone in making this statement, that the medicine men rob their poor victims of large sums of money for their incantations. Now under this aspect at least the medicine man does not help the Indians as a minister of religion. Besides the ludicrous actions, the unearthly yelling and the foolish beating of the sticks on the floor can't be said to help the physical condition of the sick. The medicine men in carrying on in this manner, cause the sufferer extreme anxiety and fear, the noise causes fever and prevents rest; and not unfrequently life is thus shortened. Our agent would be willing to put a stop to all these foolish practices; he says he is going to try his best to bring about a change. I hope that if the occasion presents itself your Reverence will also put in a good word.

Dear Father Neate:

Your letter of February 27, in reply to my letter of January 21, in regard to Senate Bill, 720, has been received.

I had a talk this morning with the Chief of the Land Division of the Indian Office, who by the way is a very good friend of ours, and brought to his attention your fear that this Bill, if it became a law, might deprive St. Ancrew's Mission of the two tracts adjoining the mission, or at least prevent the mission ever acquiring title to them. After going into the metter quite thoroughly, this official assured as that there was no occasion for any suprehension on your assured mo that there was no occasion for any apprehension on your part, that the Bill would in no way jeopard the mission's right to hold the land, and that if anything it would strengthen your right to it. I have accepted this spinion without reserve, and therefore think you need not give yourself any further worry about the matter.

Dear Father Boll:

I enclose herewith Bureau check for \$1,000 to cover the gift of the Marquette Leasus, which was promised you by telegram from Rev. William Flynn, Secretary General.

I attended a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Marquette League yesterday in New York and had the pleasure of recommending that \$1,000 be sent you immediately.

As the Marquette League has not the money in bank to spare, it was decided that they should make a plea for you. Mr. Heide, Jr., who like his father is a director of the League, promised to make up the difference, if any, between the results of the appeal and \$1,000.

The Marquotte Leagues finds itself in the same dilemma in which the Bureau finds itself. We both wish to make an appeal for you, but lack the material both in pathetic facts and appealing pictures.

I do hope as a result of my last telegram that you will see these two necessities. You might have some of the Sisters write immediately. Have them tell the manner of the death of Sister Lucretia. Did she help to rescue the children? Or was she crippled so that she could not help? You should employ a photographer. And you should pose special pictures. In these pictures the children should not be dressed as for Sunday. The Sisters should be in the pictures with the children. The pictures should show action. They should not simply be stiff groups. If you will look at THE INDIAN SENTIMEL pictures you will see what I mean. The photographer should be able to help you in creating action pictures.

By all means hurry the pictures to me and sond copies also to the Marquette League.

I hope to make an appeal for you immediately. We will all pray for good results.

Dear Reverend Mother:

It was with great regret that I borned that one of your Sisters, Sister Lucretia, who entered your motherhouse at Clen Riddle from Philadelphia thirty-seven years ago, lost her life in the fire that completely destroyed convent and school at St. Andrew's Indian Mission, Pendleton, Oregon. The news of the heroism of the few Disters who led to safety all the girls and small boys who were sleeping in the building, must have proved a great consolation to you.

I telegraphed to Father Boll, and asked him to ask the Sisters to send me information that I could use in the letter of appeal which I must send out for the purpose of getting help to rebuild the convent and school. In compliance with the request, father Boll wrote and the Sisters wrote also. I can not gather from their letters any definite information as to just how it happened that dister lucretia was not saved with the children who were led safely out of the building. I am sure that all at St. Andrews are very much distraged over the disaster. I hesitate very much to urge them for more information, but it is imperative that I have pathetic or heroic details if it be possible to get them. I can not possibly came to the assistance of the mission until I have first appealed to the clarity of the Catholic later. You must have received detailed information from the Superior in charge of your Sisters at St. Andrews. May I ask you to inform me if the jeroic Sisters were obliged to choose between rescuing their invalid Sister and saving the seventy-two little children confided to their sare?

Father Boll informs me that the Sisters can not appear in a picture. It will be necessary for me to have a picture showing the Sisters and the children. It occurred to me that you might have some pictures of your Sisters with the Indian children. If you have any at all, I will ask you to note on the reverse side the names of the Sisters appearing in the picture, and send the pictures to me for selection at the earliest possible moment. I promise that I will return every picture to you safely. I know that you will cooperate with me in every way that you can so that I may make a successful appeal. The convent and school must be reducit and the appeal must be made to the laity while the tragedy is still fresh in their minds. I urge you to give this totter your immediate attention.

In the source of a conference I had yesterday with Commissioner Burke relative to the renewal of our Tribel Funds school contracts, he referred to the unsetisfactory condition of your school buildings at the time of his visit to your mission and the dostruction of one of the buildings by the late fire and asked what was being done towards meeting the unfortunate situation. I told him that very considerable repairs and improvements had been sude on the buildings following the adverse report of School Supervisor Coon and that plane for rebuilding overs our under consideration by you. He then referred to the vecont Covernment school buildings at Coutills, and suggested the possibility of lassing them to your mission, at a nominal routal. He spoke of a dollar a year," but, of course, this was a mero figure of speach. I to is the Commissioner I would be gled to consider his suggestion, and beaus I am writing you this letter. Collowing my telegrem of today requesting you to emait it offere making any contract for building. It seems to me that it would be an excellent thing to take adventage of this opportunity. The buildings in question, of course, are for superior in every may to the mission buildings, one sould enable you to carry on the school in a way that would be above all criticions. I do not know what will be the rental charge, but I am inclined to think it would not be less than \$500 or more than \$1,000 a year. The repairs would have to be borne by you. The policy of the lacian Office in all cases of lensing of Covernment buildings is to require the tenent to make all necessary repairs.

I must ask you to treat this matter as absolutely confidential, telling no one about it, except the listers, and then to them only after they are bound to secreey. If the matter becomes known, it is likely to bring about opposition and this might result in failure to bring the case to a successful conclusion.

The Harqueste League has sent on \$2,000 for you and I expect to be able to collect \$3,000 for you from the appeal that is now going out. This help would enable tou to make the repairs necessary to put the Government buildings in proper condition for occupancy in time forepaning of the new school year.

Dear Father Boll: The matter of the leasing of the Umatilla Government school plant, I am sorry to say, is all "up in the air." The Umatilla Superintendent, in his report to the Indian Office which has just been received, states that quite a considerable portion of the buildings are now occupied and used by the Agency employees, and that to provide other quarters for these employees would entail an expenditure of about \$10,000. He also suggests that the turning over of the buildings to your mission might result in some friction between the Government authorities and the mission authorities. He expresses the opinion that, unless an adequate rental were charged, the proposed leasing from a financial standpoint would not be advisable. For these reasons he recommends that the property be not leased to St. Andrew's Mission. Commissioner Burke is absent in the West and will not return before August 1. This morning, I took up the matter with Mr. Meritt, the Assistant Commissioner. He said, as I expected he would, that he did not feel like taking any action upon a matter that had originated withthe Commissioner and therefore desired that the case be held up until the Commissioner's return. I told Mr. Meritt that you would want to open the school early in September and that if the property were turned over to you it would be necessary to make considerable repairs and improvements, and therefore it was important that action should be had before the Commissioner's return, and at an early a day as possible. Mr. Meritt then said he would send the Superintendent's report to the Commissioner. I told him this would be satisfactory to us. I am hopeful that the Commissioner will reach a decision at an early date, but am frank to say that I am somewhat doubtful if it will be a favorable one. For some years prior to 1902 what is known as the "Browning Ruling" was in force, in which it was held that "Indian parents have no right to designate what school their children shall attend." In 1902 the Secretary of the Interior directed that the Browning Ruling should be abnogated, and in a circular of the Commission r of Indian Affairs to Indian Agents and Superintendents deted January 17, 1902, it was stated that this has been done. Since that time the right of an Indianparent to select the school of his choice for his children has not been questioned by the Indian Office. It therefore follows that Superintendent Babcock has no right to compel the children of your school to go to any Government school without the consent of the parents. You should make this clear to the Indians who are interested.

It would appear that Mr. Baboock is taking advantage of the fact that you can not open your school before October 20. But, as you say, you are not responsible for this delay. It is due, of course, to your having to put off starting the new buildings until such time as it was definitely settled whether of not the Commissioner's idea of turning over the Umatilla Government school paint to your mission could be determined.

This resulted in a delay of at least some six weeks, and made it impossible for you to complete the erection of the buildings by the usual time to open the school this year. The postponement of the opening of the school for a little over a month will not prove any detriment to your pupils. It is therefore evident that there is not the slightest excuse for Mr. Babcock attempting to take away the pupils from your school and place them in some Government school.

I am inclosing a copy of the revocation of the Browning Ruling. If you think it advisable you might show this to Mr. Babookk.

Provincial told me that I had to ask you for funds, as the mission property belongs to the Bureau. The insurance was formerly paid by Mother Catherine, we curselves had the bailding insured only since 1921, yet our insurance Company paid us more than our premium called for. I have an idea that the former Insurance Company would give us something if they were appealed to. Please, dear Father, try to help us aut or else we will have a building but it will remain unoccupied. The furniture will cost quits a little, as we lost absolutely everything. Dear Mr. McLood:

I thank you for your letter of August 18% which reached me September 13 with pictures for THE INDIAN SENTINEL. I am aware that you sent pictures before, but as they were accompanied by no items that would be of interest in THE INDIAN SENTINEL. I was unable to make use of them.

While the picture of the Corpus Christi procession and the story would be of interest, I would not be able to use it except in one particular issue. Baseball pictures could only be used in baseball season. Pictures of altars are of no interest unless a missionary is shown at the altar while his Indians are shown attending the services. Unless pictures of individuals are characteristically Indian and the pictures themselves show action, such pictures are absolutely worthless for publication. Landscapes mean nothing unless there are Indians in the foreground to identify them as pi tures of an Indian mission. The same is true of chapels, schools, etc. The close-up study of a fine old Indian is always welcome for the "Who's Who" department providing the story which it illustrates is worth publishing. Group pictures are hard to reproduce in half-tone cuts if out of focus. Unfortunately, the two good group pictures which you sent, showing the Bishop accompanied by pirects and Indians, are very much out of focus and I doubt if we will she able to do anything with them. Attractive pictures of children, aspecially children poorly dressed can always be used. The picture is more valuable if the missionary of a Sister accompanies the

To reimburse you for your expenses in connection with the pictures which you have taken in the past and the pictures which I have just received from you, I enclose herewith check for \$2. In taking pictures for THE INDIAN SENTINEE, I would suggest that you limit yourself to such as are characteristically Indian. Of the twenty-three pictures just received from you, only three would be representative of Indian missions. The pictures show real interest, however, and it may be if you take a few pictures and send them in for inspection I would be able to advise you whether you have caught the idea of news interest, which I have tried to convey in this letter.

Dear Father Boll:

I have received your letter of September 8.

I realize fully your great need for help, but owing to lack of funds, it will be impossible, I regret to say, to render you any financial ausistance at this time.

I advise that you make an appeal to Rev. J. B. Tennelly, S.S.kD.D., Secretary of the Indian and Negro Commission, 401 Michigan Avenue, N.E., Brookland, D.C., and to Right Rev. John F. Noll, Bishop of Fort Wayne, Indiana, who is the Secretary of the Home Mission Board.

I suggest that you include in your a peal the destruction by fire of your buildings, give the number of priests and Sisters in the school and the number of pupils, the cost of erecting new buildings, and the amount of money needed to meet this cost. You should also advert to the fact that the Commissioner of Indian Affairs was very much dissatisfied with the condition of your buildings before the fire and was insisting upon a marked improvement in them. You should point out that unless the new buildings would provide accommodations and equipment that will be satisfactory to the Commissioner, there is danger that he may insist that your school is not a proper institution in which to place Indian children, and that, in the event that your school can not be opened, the one hundred or more pupils who have been enrolled in it, the great majority of whom are Catholics, will be placed in Government schools, where they will bome under Protestant influence.

In case you write Doctor Tennelly I should be most willing to strongly recommend at the meeting of the Distributing Board, to be held on November 11, the granting of a generous allocation to you.
