Right Reverend Monsignor,

I am sorry that

your letter of June 18 has not answered until now.

All of the catholic children at the Indian school north of town were in at least to make their Easter duty. I asked some of my parishioners to go out there in cars, bring the children in to Mass and take them back afterwards. That can be done once or twice a year, but I cannot rely on the people here to do that every Sunday.

I think the best arrangement would be to have the regular bus driver go out there each Sunday, bring the children to church and take them back to the school after Mass. Buses run between Ft Sill and Lawton, but do not go by the Indian School. However, I think that I could arrange with the owner of the buses to do as indicated above during the months that school is in session.

I have spoken to him about it and am waiting until he has consulted a partner of his for his answer.

July 8 After repeated inquiries, the bus man just now has told me that he would charge \$3.50 a Sunday, which is more than I had thought he would ask.

Dear Miss Sohan:

It has been a long time since you sent me the first check to pay transportation for the Indian children at the Government School of Fort Sill to church in town here on Sundays. I ought to have written to you much sooner to thank you for your kindness. But I was trying to arrange better terms and I wanted to let you know that the money would go farther than we had first expected. I have succeeded and the cost will be not more than \$2.50 a Sunday which will be less than the \$12 a month. The \$47.50 which you sent will, therefore, cover expenses well into the year 1931.

May God bless you for your generosity, through which, I hope, the Faith may be preserved in these Indian children.

Had I a car myself I would gladly haul them or have them hauled back and forth myself, but I can not allow myself such luxuries as a car and must hire one when there are sickcalls to the Indian School or Indian hospital nearby. I consider that as my part of the upkeep of the Catholic Indian work.

gradually worn down. I have met with the same discourtesy myself a few times.

information about Mr. Smith. The Sisters teach Sunday School in the Santa Fe  
Government School every Sunday and probably know what kind of man he is.

I shall communicate with you when I hear from Santa Fe.
