Dear Father Hughes:

At the very outset of this new year I have to trouble you with a petition. It is this: At present there are three new chapels and in a few months there will be four new chapels which are without a bell. Among the Navajos there are no so-called "pregoneros" or town criers, who summon the faithful to church as is the custom among the Pueblo Indians and since most of the Navajos are not acquainted with the use of a watch they can hardly be expected to be present in the chapel at the proper time.

Will you kindly send out this S.O.S. call for 3 or 4 chapel bells and thus enable us to ring the summons for divine services? \$40.00, perhaps \$35.00 will purchase a bell of the proper size.

Dear Father Emanuel:

The new regulations on religious instructions have not yet been printed by the Indian Office. When they are, I will send you a copy.

In the second paragraph of your letter I assume you are seeking information about the \$1,200,000 authorized by the Act of May 29, 1928 (45 Stat., p. 899) for the purchase of land and water rights for the use and benefit of Indians of the Navajo Tribe. \$200,000 of the \$1,200,000 will be appropriated each fiscal year beginning with July 1928. The Government has options already on land belonging to Mr. Vogt, Mr. Babbit and several others.

If this is not the information you are seeking, write me again and I will try to answer your questions.



Rev. and dear Father:

Some time ago we received a goodly supply of various medicines you had obtained for us from the Catholic Medical Mission Board for our dispensary at Lukachukai and I wish to thank you and the Board ever so much for your kindness.

The medicines sent proved to be of great help and I assure you we are greatly indebted to you. Only they who are acquainted with missionary work among aborigines can fully comprehend the great spiritual advantages medical assistance affords. It is for this reason that our Protestant neighbors intend to erect number of hospitals and dispensaries on this Navajo Reservation, using these charitable institutions as a means of proselytizing. Various examples could be adduced to substantiate this statement.

Would to God we were able to erect several other dispensaries similar to the one at Lukachukai, but financial embarrassment forbids. Only last Thursday at one of the trading posts a lady asked me why we did not build a hospital at that place, adding: "The Presbyterians told me they would build a hospital here at once if I only would procure the thumb prints (signature) from the Indians." The difference between the Catholic and Protestant missions in this respect is that the Protestants have the necessary funds for medical purposes, but can not obtain the consent of the Indians to build a hospital, while we, without any difficulty, can obtain the signatures, but the funds are lacking. Time and again the Navajos have asked us to build hospitals.

Again thanking you, dear Father, and expressing the hope that this first shipment of medicines will not be the last one, I remain,

Dear Fr. Hughes:

Following the suggestion of the Indian Office as contained in your letter of 4/10, with reference to the transfer of Mrs. Geiger, head-matron at Fort Defiance, I spoke yesterday to Superintendent John G. Hunter regarding this matter.

Mr. Hunter thought that the reports, unfavorable to Mrs. Geiger, had been sent to the Indian Office before his time and it was for this reason that he had suggested that she be permitted to continue in her present position till the end of the school year, though her probation had transpired before that, because then he himself would be able, very probably, to send in a more favorable report.

Although Mrs. Geiger, at times, may be somewhat hasty in her actions or speech, she has, as Mr. Hunter mentioned, a good intention, and desires to do what is right. He considers her a well educated lady.

Nevertheless as the position of a head-matron at the largest Navajo Reservation Boarding School is a rather difficult one, and since Mrs. Geiger insisted upon a transfer, he considered it better for her to start in at a smaller school after the close of the present school year. He suggested Keams Canyon, where there is, as he said, a vacancy. Mr. Hunter also mentioned that he would gladly offer Mrs. Geiger opportunities to get properly acquainted with the matron's work.

Though Mrs. Geiger does not know of Mr. Hunter's suggestion regarding a transfer to Keams Canyon, I have no doubt that such an action would be satisfactory to her. She herself mentioned to me that she would prefer a smaller school.

Would that we had many more such kind benefactors and then we could more easily supply the many demands made by the old Indians who bring the tiny tots who are only covered with a dirty rag and have no covering on their tiny feet.

These old Indians are still pagans and by drawing them to the mission and supplying them with clothing we can induce them to allow the little ones to come to school and so obtain the gift of Baptism.

A thousand thanks and a fervent assurance of our daily prayers for you.

Hon. and dear Mr. Commissioner:-

As superior of Saint Michaels Catholic Mission conducted by the Franciscan Fathers of St. Michaels, Arizona for the Navajo Indians, I respectfully request the Interior Department to set aside a tract of land, conveniently located near the Chas. H. Burke School at Fort Wingate, New Mexico, same to be used for the site of a proposed chapel and pastor's residence.

I know that the Government welcomes every agency which has the welfare of the Indians for its purpose and for that reason has, as a general policy, permitted the establishment of missions in close proximity to her schools in the Indian country, so that the spiritual needs of Indian students might be supplied. The Government has in the past allowed the use of school buildings for religious services at Fort Wingate, an arrangement which, after all, has been rather unsatisfactory, both to the missionaries and to the school authorities.

For this reason and since a large number of the pupils of the Chas. Burke school belong to the Catholic faith, I would appreciate whatever you may be able to do for us to the end that we might establish a Catholic mission at Fort Wingate.

The choice of the site may be made by Superintendent Young and naturally we should prefer to have it favorably located so that the Catholic pupils as well as employees may attend Catholic services with as little inconvenience as possible.

Rt. Rev. and dear Msgr. Hughes:-

I am enclosing copy of a letter just recently received from the Assistant Commissioner of Indian Affairs with reference to a chapel site at Fort Wingate. It is, of course, not at all encouraging and the fact that Commissioner Rhoads did not sign this letter is not conclusive proof that he has not been consulted in the matter. However, Mr. Young, Superintendent at Fort Wingate, is of the opinion that the question has not reached the higher authority in the Indian Office and he thinks we ought not to give up. He believes it would be well for you to call on Commissioner Rhoads personally and explain the situation to him. For your information I am therefore submitting the following:

2 In the first place [Fort Wingate has more the character of a reservation school than any other non-reservation school that I know of. It is located in the very midst of the Navajo country and surrounded on all sides by resident Navajo Indians, who are presumed to have no reasonable objections against sending their children to this school as they might have against the sending of pupils to non-reservation schools.]

3 [Haskell, Albuquerque and Riverside, for instance, are non-reservation schools located in cities which have Catholic churches nearby. Furthermore the school grounds are comparatively small and adjoin private property which might be available, so that the ~~same~~ concession of school property would not be absolutely necessary to accomodate church authorities. Ft. Wingate, on the ~~other~~ other hand is a large reservation comprising, I think, 130 square miles, with the nearest Catholic church at Gallup, New Mexico, 15 miles away, and if a church were to be erected off this Government property, it could not be done within a distance of less than 6 or perhaps 7 miles from the school. Would the Department be satisfied to have us erect a church on non-Government property at such a distance and then agree to send the Catholic pupils to church on Sundays as provided by regulation # 138? I am sure they would not, for the simple reason that this would be too great a hardship and inconvenience for the school.] They would probably repeat that they should be glad to continue the "custom to extend such facilities as are available for religious services at non-reservation schools." I should reply that Fort Wingate is not a strictly non-reservation school and that at other non-reservation schools the "school facilities" are always supplemented by attendance of the pupils at a real church on Sundays. The arrangement at Fort Wingate has been found to be but a poor makeshift which has proven most unsatisfactory to everybody, employees, pupils and missionaries. The general policy referred to in the second paragraph of the Asst. Commissioner's letter does not cause these inconveniences at the non-reservation schools mentioned above for the reason that churches are fairly easily

accessible, but I maintain that Fort Wingate presents a far different situation, which to my mind deserves to be considered an exception that would warrant a departure from the general policy.]

[5] This is not a fight between Catholic and Protestants; we are in no way trying to oppose the Protestants in our attempt to get a chapel site at Fort Wingate; in fact, we should be glad to have them locate a church there also, and if we can get along with each other without any religious animosity in spite of existing disagreeable conditions, I see no reason why we should fare worse if each denomination have a chapel of its own.

[6] The Government by applying its seemingly iron-clad policy to Fort Wingate, is doing what in effect amounts to forcing Catholic children into a distant school and telling them when they get there, that they may not worship God according to the dictates of their conscience. The Catholic church is not essentially nor merely a class room; it is more than that and every Catholic, looking upon his place of worship as the "House of God", feels that this place should be one that is set aside for the worship of God exclusively. The auditorium, which is used for all kinds of games, amusements, meetings, etc., is certainly not the proper place for Catholic services. The playing of noisy games with the boisterous cheering, etc., followed by a sudden conversion of the place into a house of religious worship is far from being conducive to religious and prayerful sentiments and evidently would tend toward ~~anyting~~ anything else but to inspire the child mind with the true meaning of Catholic devotion. The central doctrine of our Faith is the Real Presence; conditions at Fort Wingate prevent the keeping of the Blessed Sacrament there or even conveniently near by and it is hardly ever possible for the priest to give Benediction with the Blessed Sacrament. Does this not make it impossible for a Catholic to practice his religion as he feels he should practice it? If Fort Wingate is to be a permanent institution why should we be forced to take care of our Catholic charges whom the Government sends there by such a makeshift and unsatisfactory arrangement? Where such a condition necessarily exists, it is true, we can manage to "get along", but I believe no human agency, even ~~if~~ if it happens to be our dear Uncle Sam, should be permitted to prevent the remedying of such a situation where it possibly might be done, as is the case at Fort Wingate.]

[7] The general policy of the Government in this matter, as I pointed out above, is easily justifiable as applied to non-reservation schools, for it in no way positively excludes the possibility of free Catholic worship, whereas at Fort Wingate, the application of this policy is the only thing that prevents the full and free exercise of the Catholic religion.

Father Emanuel took up this matter of a Ft. Wingate chapel site in June 1925 and in a letter to you under date of June 29, 1925 Commissioner Burke gave practically the same reply as is given in the enclosed letter from Asst. Commissioner Scattergood. On July 2, 1925 Mr. Lusk wrote to Father Emanuel in this connection: "I am inclined to think that one of the reasons for the Commissioner's action is that he feared there would be quite a deal of friction among the missionaries of the different churches if they were permitted to have sites at Fort Wingate, for of course if it was granted to one church it would have to be granted to all that applied." At best I would consider this no more than an excuse, and a flimsy and weak one at that. [In granting us our

request I do not believe the Department will have to fear that they will have established a precedent, for I doubt very much whether an identical situation might be found any where else in the Service.]

If the decision of the Indian Office is based upon the technicality of establishing a mission on school grounds, perhaps we could relieve the embarrassment by referring the matter to the War Department, asking them to request the Interior Department to relinquish the plot of ground that we and another denomination desire, so that the War Department could set this plot aside for religious purposes. Do you think that if all other arguments should fail this plan might be attempted?

I am writing this letter in order that you may understand how I feel about the Ft. Wingate situation and in the hope that you might present the matter to the Commissioner from my angle of viewpoint. Should you deem my arguments weak or insufficient, I should be glad to hear from you. An exchange of views will undoubtedly throw more light on the problem and I am sure would eventually help us to prevail upon the Indian Office to grant our fair and reasonable request.

The Office has, by reference of Superintendent S.M.M. Young, of the Charles H. Burke School, your letter of August 12, relative to a tract of land set aside near the Charles H. Burke School to be used as a site for a proposed chapel and pastor's residence. Superintendent Young says you wish to erect the church building near the entrance of the school grounds, evidently on school land.

It has not been the general policy to grant concessions of the character desired at nonreservation schools, and other requests of the same character at this school and at other schools have been presented but not granted.

While the privilege of securing land on the school reserve cannot be extended, it has been the custom to extend such facilities as are available for religious services at nonreservation schools, as has been done at Charles H. Burke, and the Office will continue to cooperate so far as it can reasonably do so.

Rt. Rev. and dear Monsignor Hughes:-

Replying to your letter of Sept. 16th, will say that the Anna Cogan memorial chapel is under construction. Whether it will be completed this fall must depend entirely upon weather conditions which have been most unfavorable for the past three months. The rainy season has extended through a longer period than ever before and I fear that as soon as the rains cease, cold weather will set in.

I think you are aware that application for the chapel site had to be delayed until November 23, 1928 due to the fact that Supt. Duclous could not verify statements and signatures before that time. And when the application was sent in, Washington appeared very slow in arriving at a decision, for the site was not granted until May or the early part of June.

Had the funds been sufficient I would have been able to give this work in contract and the chapel would now be completed. Building material must be hauled over terrible roads for a distance of 75 miles--I refer to lumber--and this bill, not including flooring and ceiling, amounts to \$434.82. This of course leaves a rather small amount for stone walls, windows, furnishings, etc., and so I have been forced to get Brother Julian to take up the work. He has been occupied at Keams Canyon until only recently and now is superintending the work with the help of Indian labor and a stone mason, whilst our own truck is used for the hauling of stone whenever possible.

Just the other day Brother and his companions were marooned in the quarry by a heavy rain and they had to wade through water up to their hips to get home. I am sorry the work is not progressing more rapidly, but I am sure you will understand that I am doing all I possibly can to speed it up in spite of these many difficulties.

I still hope to have this chapel completed this fall and to be able to send you a picture of the completed structure before Christmas.

Dear Father Jerome:

I have your letter of September 26. Your argument is excellent. We should not stop until we get the site. But we should proceed with courtesy and caution.

We could easily get the New Mexican Senators and Representative to urge your request. As many of the Indians are from Arizona, we could also get, if need be, the Arizona delegation. I would take that up here.

Does the Protestant mission desire a site? What is the name of the church and the head missionary? Do you think that it would strengthen our request to have them ask at the same time? I am inclined to think so.

Our request could be made on its own merits. The rights of conscience of the Catholic children are clear although we would not make the argument in such bald terms.

Confidentially, the real reason for the general policy is because there is danger of meddling by resident missionaries in the small world of a small school reserve.

I notice that you would want a site big enough to allow for a chapel and ultimately a residence. How large a tract would you ask for?

I will discuss the matter informally at the first opportunity with Commissioner Rhoads and Assistant Commissioner Scattergood. They work in unison. They have their desks in the same room. Before discussing it finally I would like to have an answer to the questions above.

Dear Father Hughes:

(1) In answer to your letter of October 8th, referring to a chapel site at Fort Wingate, I wish to mention that the Rehoboth Mission, some 4 miles east of Gallup, conducted by the Christian Reformed Church, and being the only Protestant denomination that gives religious instructions at the Chas. H. Burke School, formally applied for a chapel site at Fort Wingate a few months ago. J. H. Boscher is at the head of the Rehoboth Mission, whilst Rev. Jacob R. Kamps is in charge of religious services at Fort Wingate. The application for a chapel site was made, I think, by the head of the Christian Reformed Church (Rev. Bede?).

(2) When unfortunately in my application of August 12 I asked for a site for a proposed chapel and pastor's residence, with the intention of conveying the idea that there would be a room adjacent to the chapel or below the same roof where the Father could stay over night when necessary. It never was our intention to have at Fort Wingate a separate building for a residing priest. All we desire is to have a church of our own for the reasons mentioned in my letter of September 26th. To add another reason: Only a few days ago Fr. Innocent Mittlestaedt, O.F.M., in charge of the Catholic mission at Fort Wingate mentioned to me how much more convenient it would be on Communion Sundays if the Blessed Sacrament were preserved, because then he could distribute Holy Communion early in the morning and have mass at the regular hour. As it is, mass is said on those days at 6 o'clock and that hurriedly so the children will be in time for breakfast.

(3) In regard to the location and size of building lot Mr. Young had intended to call a meeting of the missionaries concerned (Catholic and Christian Reformed) as soon as the sites were granted and have them select their lot. We would like to have about 2 acres for a chapel site, however, we will be satisfied with less.

(4) As regards the "danger of meddling". Such danger, far from being increased will rather be removed if each denomination has a chapel of its own. At present, sometimes the service of one church is delayed because the other church, using the same hall did not get finished with services in time and yet the separate denominations get along without any religious animosity.

Dear Father Hughes, your letter inspires confidence and I am living in hopes that our efforts will finally be crowned with success for the honor and glory of God. I think that if Commissioner Rhoads would fully understand the religious situation at the Chas. H. Burke School he would not hesitate a moment to grant our request.

Dear Father Hughes:

In answer to your letter of October 8, referring to a chapel site at Fort Wingate, I wish to mention that the Rehoboth Mission, some four miles east of Gallup, conducted by the Christian Reformed Church, and being the only Protestant denomination that gives religious instructions at the Charles H. Burke School, formally applied for a chapel site at Fort Wingate a few months ago. J. H. Bescher is at the head of the Rehoboth Mission, whilst Rev. Jacob R. Kamps is in charge of religious services at Fort Wingate. The application for a chapel site was made, I think, by the head of the Christian Reformed Church (Rev. Bescher).

As regards the "danger of meddling", such danger, far from being increased will rather be removed if each denomination has a chapel of its own. At present, sometimes the service of one church is delayed because the other church, using the same bell did not get finished with services in time and yet the separate denominations get along with any religious animosity.

I wish to add one more reason why a Catholic chapel is needed. If we had a Catholic chapel, we could reserve the Blessed Sacrament, and Communion could be given to our children on the Sunday mornings appointed with proper dignity and without unseemly hurry and yet all within the space of fifteen minutes, because Mass would not have to be said at the time of Communion, but would be said for the children later in the morning and after the children had had their breakfast. Now, since we have no chapel, Mass must be said at 6 a.m. and hurriedly on Communion Sundays. The result is that the children are not properly prepared because the priest is engaged at Mass instead of at vocal prayers with the children. Children who receive Communion and who, of course, are prepared therefor by Confession, naturally show the best discipline they are capable of in school. And that is for the good of the service.

We would like to have about two acres for a chapel site. If necessary, we would have to get along with less.

I think that if Commissioner Rhoads would fully understand the religious situation at the Charles H. Burke School he would not hesitate a moment to grant our request for a site for a chapel and chaplain's quarters.



Your little protege's picture did not turn out so well and so we had to get it again. Little Margaret's Indian name is "Tagala" which means "Returning from war".

A shipment of five boxes came and I presume they are the shipment you wrote of. Everything is so useful and in such good condition that it can be used at once. Of course those good coats will be put in emphor until next winter.

By having clothes to give the Indians, we draw them to the mission and it is often the means of gaining souls. The other day "Jumbo" an old Indian scout of war days and a present medicine man came begging. We inquired if some one was sick and learned of a very sick child. We notified the priest and two of the Sisters accompanied the priest, driving more than ten miles. The parents consented to have the child baptized and so there is one more little Navajo christian.

I hope you will find a favorable opportunity of visiting St. Michael's. I am sure you will join the many enthusiastic boosters of our Navajo land.

Dear Miss Hallegan:

The package you so kindly sent us was just on time for service. The demands for clothing, shoes, etc., are great and our supplies were low when our dear Lord sent us more by means of you.

This winter has been an exceptionally severe one for the Indians. They depend greatly on the sale of their cattle, sheep and wool for their support, but owing to exposure and starvation, the sheep and cattle have died. This is a great loss to the Indians.

Although the tribe is yet pagan many are asking for baptism. A young man came a long distance to bring the priest to his dying grandfather, who had asked many times for baptism. The priest baptized him and the next day when the Sisters visited him, he and the pagans in the Hogan were most attentive while the prayers were being said. He allowed the Sisters to pin a medal and a crucifix on him. He is a relative of one of our children and we feel sure it is the good influence of the children that inspires the older Indians to join the church.

May we ask you to pray for those poor pagans that they may receive the gift of Faith. Again thanking you and assuring you of a large share in our prayers,
