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

Mrs. McGowan at her own request received a transfer last summer and soon thereafter left the Service. I was also informed that she had been too brisk in her dealings with the Indians, as field matron.

Rev. and dear Father Erkenswick:

Again I am fortunate in being able to offer you my sincerest thanks and appreciation for the liberal gift which came to our little Apache Mission through the courtesy of the Right Rev. Monsignor Hughes, as part of the amount sent him by your Reverence for distribution among the needy missions. I am extremely grateful for the portion allotted to us therefrom, mostly so, because it carries to me the conviction that our Indians still has friends who unstintingly come to his aid. Without such intelligent co-workers in the mission fields, especially among tribes who up to a recent date had courted quite different aspirations than to become loyal children of the Catholic Church, it is of vital importance that her representatives be able to show them that this church takes an unflagging interest in their spiritual welfare, this, however, were impossible for any human agency without the loving help of generous friends who stand behind the missionary. "From the stomach to the heart the trail is short" used to be the old adage, old or new, without giving oneself to indiscretions I have found more than once that its truth has the weight of gold. Oftentimes people are apt to think, if the missionary is sent only among them, things will adjust themselves. Either such a missionary, would he succeed, must be a staff of first magnitude on the firmament of the kingdom of heaven, or the precise moment must have arrived which the Lord had decreed, wherin to make children of God out of wayward offenders. Neither is the case among our Apaches. There are some who were and are not deaf to the "Voice in the wilderness." Whence we keep on fishing with the ordinary bait. Our Lutheran competitors are still strong by our side, and the medicine man eyes us with the anticipations of his reverses. Nevertheless we have an encouraging little bunch of children who here and in our Catholic mission school near Phoenix prepare themselves for Baptism. When at Mass on Sunday mornings they sing hymns with youthful clear voices, it feels so remarkably strange that after the few years of cultural training the olden dreadful aspect has changed to something like this. This Indian has many good traits. Despite the backwood man, he is, he has the stuff of a gentleman with a rough grace, and a heart susceptible of kindness, who when viewed in the light of his history conjointly with the varying will of the Lord does not fail to evoke our interest, which to deserve he is at present making hard efforts.

It was quite appropriate that Edson B. Meritt, formerly Assistant Indian Commissioner & now attorney in the Senator's office was selected to represent the Secretary of the Interior and the Commissioners of Indian Affairs at the dedication of the Coaledge Dam last March. It is not generally known that it was Mr. Meritt who saved from destruction the San Carlos reservoir site by preventing the granting of a railroad right of way application through the heart of the reservoir site and thus made possible the construction of the Coaledge Dam and the reservation of 100,000 acres of land in the Gila River valley. The credit is due Mr. Meritt for having saved a property from destruction that is worth approximately \$5 million dollars and the Pima Indians will be benefited to the extent of one-half of this amount and the reservation of 50,000 acres of land that would otherwise have been a barren waste.

The San Carlos Reservoir site, on which the Coaledge Dam was built, was condemned as being impracticable by a board of engineers, by two bureaus of the Government and the application of the railway company for the right of way through the
