My dear Mission Helpers:

I just received for the chapel of my new school two nice gold plated pyxes and one set of devout Via Crucis pictures and I owe this refined gesture of Christian love to you. God bless you all! And sure I'll remember you all at the Altar. (Ah that reminds me I need and artistic little altar for September 8th) close of distraction - again (Father Hughes will find a donor if you pray.)

You have prepared two hiding places for the King of the world en route to sick Indians and inspirational station pictures that bespeak the King's love and readiness to fight for the souls of poor degraded Indians.

A few days ago a 73 year old Indian reputed an outlaw even amongst his own was burned to death in his shack. Next day I told my Indians I thought he went straight to heaven - why? Well just before Christmas when threatened with pneumonia I beat the medicine man to his aid and with a broken crucifix, a few prayers, some talk thru an interpreter (his daughter) his bitterness vanished, the tiger became a lamb for shriving and Extreme Unction and after the Sisters and Indians made visits he did little else but pray and talk to God, for he had closed his eyes to outer things and turned to the interior and spiritual ones. How wonderful is God and mysterious in His loving dispensations! He had prepared that Poor old Indian for that fiery ordeal and with one cry he was in the arms of Our Father who is in heaven. But breathe one Ave for him and he will help me to pay for my new school and furnish it too in readiness for September 8th. I have to write anything except checks to pay my Master's bills and now in my old age I'm getting an awful talker and endless writer but I'm talking to friends and a volcano must now and then exhibit some fire-works. Here I stop back to the trenches! Pray for my mission. Its christian educationally amzg inspirational efficiency must be reflected in beautiful modern buildings and attractive surroundings that say God is good. Everything is free and every Indian child is welcome.

Before leaving for a visitation of the Northwest missions, Father Hughes has directed me to write you on such matters.

I regret exceedingly that the Bureau has no funds on which it could draw a \$1,000 for material and wages on the new St. Andrew's School. The Bureau has been hit doubly hard by the depression. We find great difficulty in taking care of our old obligations.

The only source the Bureau has for getting money is The Indian Sentinel. Even in good times it is almost impossible to secure money for the erection of school buildings.

I herewith enclose a snap shot of
the new St. Andrews Indian Boarding School of boys.

St. Andrews Mission.

It is a two story building of concrete, hollow tile
and brick in California Mission style with white
stucco finish. Dimensions 132' x 43 ft. It is
fire-proof throughout with no chimneys or fire-place.
It is heated from a central heating plant 75' distant.

Near the heating plant is located the central
lighting plant. The first floor is the home of the
Native Indian boys with a spacious recreation
hall, concrete floors, dormitory, wash room, lockers,
toilets, showers and two rooms and bath
for the teachers. Two doors open to the outside
on all rooms. Access to the second floor, devoted
exclusively to class room work, is had by way of
an indoor stairway off of the boys' recreation
hall. The second floor has four well lighted
standard class rooms facing east. Across the hall
are the faculty and administration rooms and a
private chapel. There is provided a comfortable
rest room for the teaching Sisters of St. Francis and toilets
and lavatory for the little girls during school hours.
With the arrangement of the class rooms, two

five standard class-rooms may be reserved exclusively
for the girls and two for the boys with complete separation.
Separate outside entrances are provided for boys
and girls. The building is steam-heated throughout
with modern plumbing, hot and cold water, drinking
fountains etc. The building is surmounted by an
electrically illuminated Crook for festive occasions.
With ample class-room accommodation for 150 grade
pupils in the new building, the other building ~~may~~
serve as the Indian girls' dormitory home with better
facilities for the teaching Sisters. St Andrews Mission
can provide a Christian School home to the little
poor Indian children of all Eastern Oregon
as soon as Catherine TeKakwita raises me a loan
or gift of \$10,000.00. I have put my case in her
hands. Surely she will not turn a deaf ear to the
mute pleadings of the poor little Indian children
^{in union of prayers}

My dear Father Corbett:

Your letter of July 26, addressed to Supervisor Thompson and inclosing pictures of your new school, was received and noted with considerable interest.

The Office appreciates your attitude toward taking the children from the Indian colony at Burns, Oregon. You realize that it is the general policy of the Office, as well as of outside influence such as yours, to keep the Indian children in their homes and educate them therefrom as far as possible. We feel sure that you, in consultation with Father Loeser, Superintendent Perkins and Day School Teacher Talley will make careful investigation of homes from which these children are to come and be guided accordingly. That is to say, if the home conditions are such that children can stay comfortably and go to school we greatly prefer that.

We appreciate that it would increase the efficiency of the teaching work at Burns colony to have the number in the day school decreased and also give Mr. Talley more time to do community work, which, as we understand, is badly needed there.

Dear Father Corbett:

Copy of the letter of August 5 from Commissioner Rhoads to yourself has been sent me and Father Loeser.

As I have not before me copy of your letter of July 26 to Supervisor Thompson, although I have copy of Supervisor Thompson's letter of August 5, I can not judge what you and Father Loeser propose. You two are the best judges of what should be done in the circumstances.

But Father Loeser is doing such an unusually good job, I think you should hesitate to take into your boarding school the Indian children under his instructions at Burns.

From the Government's point of view, only children with other school facilities and from the Church's point of view only children without proper religious instructions should be taken into our boarding schools.

However, you and Father Loeser are the best judges.

Since the Government has been closing some boarding schools and cutting down the number at others, supervisors and superintendents have been "passing the buck" to our mission schools.

I know and like Thompson very well. But our mission schools can not assume Government burdens.

Sir:

This morning Father John T. Corbett came into my office and asked me for suggestions relative to the organization and conduct of the Indian Mission Schools. I made the following suggestions for his consideration,

1. That he promulgate a set of rules for the government of his school, setting forth therein the visiting days and vacation times.
2. That he use blanks similar to our application for enrollment in a nonreservation school, by means of which he will be able to secure necessary information relative to the education of the children who come to him.
3. That, through the board of Catholic Missions, the Priests in the various parishes from whence come his children be given the power to receive these applications and forward them to him for administrative action, prior to sending the children. This seems to me to be a very necessary thing, in order to relieve Father Corbett from a great deal of administrative embarrassment, by having Indian parents drive up to the school and, without seeing any of the authorities, leave the children to be cared for. This is true, not only of the Indians of this reservation, but also those from other reservations.
4. That, through the various parish priests, above mentioned, he disseminate the information that his school can not be used as either a penal institution nor an orphan's home, to simply meet the convenience of the parents. Such an attitude distracts from the beneficial results of the school work and hinders the entire scholastic body in the proper advancement in the classes.

5 That, where possible, Indian parents be required to pay some part of the expense of education, in order to aid in relieving the dire financial straits in which Father Corbett finds himself at this time.

I am writing this letter with the full knowledge and approval of Father Corbett and am sending it to you for your information and as an aid in discussing the needs of this institution with Father Hughes. I am deeply interested in the successful operation of this school, and feel that it has a distinct work to perform. If it were possible to make any contribution in the way of tuition for indigent Indian children, or otherwise, I would heartily recommend such action be taken.

The physical plant is now in very good condition, in that an old building, which was illly adapted to school purposes, was destroyed by fire, and has been replaced by a modern, fireproof building, well planned for the use to which it will be put.

I must take this opportunity to commend the administrator, Father Corbett, for the zeal with which he has furthered the interests of the institution, and the whole hearted sacrifice which he has made to its cause. He is feeling the financial stress of the times and has contracted bills, connected with the new building and the conduct of the school, which have added greatly to his administrative difficulties and which will have to be alleviated in some way as the school continues.

As stated above, I am greatly interested in the institution and feel that a discontinuance would be little short of a calamity, and, hence the reason and purpose of this letter.

Although the Department has been so kind in distributing help, strange to say, we have not yet received even 1 pound of flour or one grain of wheat for our School. Soldiers' clothes last spring were given, for Corbett had applied for 200 lbs. of wheat but none was given. It seems here we are left with less help than anywhere else. Dear Father Neete:

On October 31 I received your note, copy of which I enclose.

Many thanks for your promise to say 20 Masses, second intention for the Bureau's purpose.

I can understand that you are, indeed, crushed under the burden of \$25,000 debt on the new building. The only means which I have of appeal is through The Indian Sentinel.

It is possible that the Bishop may be able to request the American Board of Catholic Missions for a donation. That Board meets in Chicago. I do not know the date. It will probably be either before or after the meeting of the Bishops in Washington. The Washington meeting is held sometime soon after election day. Since the A.B.C.M. holds as a first principle the building of new units, usually, church, priests' house, school and convent over a period of four years or more, your building may appeal to them. However, it is my impression that the A.B.C.M. principle applies to totally new missions.

In the matter of the foregoing paragraph, I wish to urge on you two cautions. First, I know nothing authoritative about the A.B.C.M. And, secondly, your Bishop has previously urged at my writing to his priests under similar circumstances. But I see no reason why you can not take the initiative with him.

With regard to Mass intentions, I thought I made myself clear that you were to ask the Bureau to supply your own needs, which it will do as long as it has Masses.

Put in the same request to the Bureau for your assistant or assistants. I suppose you now have only Father Lajoie. We have been sending you 50 at a time. Hereafter, we will send you 100. When next you write, ask for 100 and I will understand you want them.

I have your letter of recent date, copy of which I enclose.

On October 4, the Commissioner of Indian Affairs sent circular letter No. 2885 to all superintendents in which he says:

"Cotton goods may be issued to mission schools on the same basis as flour is issued; that is, only those schools which have taken in additional pupils as a relief measure are entitled to such assistance."

You should present the mission school's needs to Superintendent Babcock for a supply of flour and/or wheat and a supply of cloth, at least for the extra children taken in because of hard times.

If Superintendent Babcock does not give you a supply from what he has on hand or if he has not the supply on hand and does not send your requisition to the Indian Office, notify me promptly. I will then take the matter up with the Indian Office.

I enclose extra copy of this letter which you may show to Superintendent Babcock.
