I was sent here two years ago last January when the Osage School, Pawhuska Oklahoma was abolished. I was there nine years. It meant a big expense and another if I am changed. She is attending St. Joseph's Academy, Tucson Arizona, and likes it fine, she has two more years before graduating. If I am left here she will finish from there. Since I am here I want to stay for the reasons I have stated. All teachers have to attend Summer School every two years and it is up to me to attend this Summer. Sacred Heart School, Gardner, Colorado April 15, 1925.

Rev. Father Hughes, Washington, D. C.

Reverend and dear Father,

You will be surprised, no doubt, to receive a letter from someone in the Rocky Mountains here whom you formerly met in Ft. Yates. Last summer, as circumstances permitted, I was transferred from our dear Indian field of labor in North Dakota to the poor Mexican Indians of the West. Here we are now, a little missionary band of six Sisters trying our utnost to educate the poor little ones to whom God has called us and brave the many inconveniences that face us. As it is, conditions are extremely poor around and it is in benalf of our school and charges here that I wish to make an appeal to you, dear Fither. Could you in your position as head of the Cachelic Indian Bureau lend us some much needed here too? Our school building is only a partially finished affair with mud-plastered walls in the two rooms where we are teaching. The rest of the building is unfinished with windows and main entrance nailed up so as to permit no light in the hall-way except through cracks between the boards where the winter cold also freely seeks admission.

For pupils' desks we have some old broken and discarded ones from other schools hardly fit for their purpose and by far not enough to accommodate the enrollment of over a hundred pupils. A long carpenters' table serves as teacher's desk and book shelves at the same time. During the cold winter months we had to content ourselves with wood as there was no coal to be had without money.

Reverend F ther Paul, our pastor, has been trying so hard to make improvements but as the last few years have been so dry and prospects are even worse this year than before he can expect little from his parishioners because they have not even enough to support themselves. He receives no salary and during the month of December inculding Christmas and New Year the total collection amounted to six dollars and some cents. Of course the people try to support him with beans and squashes when they have them but they and he cannot build a school with them. Whatever comes in is from some outside charity fund and that is little enough.

Father Bernard from Ft. Yetes sometimes writes to me and always says that the little parcohial school there is doing fine. I am so glad to hear it because many a time I have to think back of the many happy years I spent there among the Indians. I often wish we could have held out longer there but it was beyond my power and strength to do it.

Now, dear Father, knowing our conditions here could you do something for us? We would be ever so grateful and beg the dear Lord to bless you a hundred fold for

Dear Father O'Loughlin: Father Huffer informs me that you would like to get an addressograph and that if I were to have one sent to you you would send \$100 for The addressograph which I had in mind has since been sold. I am afraid that it would be too large for the work of a chancellor. There is a smaller type addressograph which costs about \$50, new and which, I think, would do your work. The Chancery Office in Providence uses one to address the priests of the discose. This would take care of as many as \$,000 to 10,000 mass. If you will look up the Addressograph Company they will give you the information. They probably have an Office in Omaha. This is simply a printing machine. Besides you have to have the plates on which the stencils are cut, the frames into which the plates fit, the drawers into which the frames are placed (holding about 175 each), and the cases into which the drawers fit. Cases can be gotten for almost any number of drawers. Unless your lit is large and the changes are frequent, it would not pay you to buy a graphotype or stencil-cutting machine.
