Dear Miss Gaupel:

Rev. Mark K. Carroll of the St. Louis Mission Society writes me that you are interested in building a mission chapel. May I ask you to inform me how large a gift you hoped to make for the erection of your chapel? There are about thirty chapels needed. But it would be necessary for me to know about how large a chapel you wish to build, for the reason that in some places small chapels would do, whereas in other places the much larger chapel and, therefore, a more expensive one would be needed in order to accommodate all the Indians of that particular locality.

The enclosed little article will give you some general information. When you reply to this letter, tell me also what name you would like your chapel to have.

I might tell you that at Santa Ysabel, California, the Indians are very anxious to have a little chapel. The name would have to be St. Elizabeth, for the reason that the chapel is to replace a very old mission chapel which bore the name of St. Elizabeth, and which was burned down sometime ago. The mission is known to the Indians under the name of St. Elizabeth and could not very well be changed. Perhaps, you would be interested in this.

I shall hope to hear from you in regard to this matter.

Dear Miss Gaupel:

I thank you for your letter of June 26, in which you say you have a gift of \$500 which you wish to give for a chapel to be dedicated to Our Blessed Mother under any title the Indians or Sisters might wish. You also say that you wish your gift to be used for a chapel built-in or otherwise, and not for the repairs or enlargement of a chapel.

I have before me a letter from Rev. Thomas M. Neate, S.J. of the Nez Perce Mission, Idaho. You may remember that this mission was destroyed by fire. It was necessary to rebuild immediately. The girls' quarters and the Sisters' convent were the first to be built. The Sisters' convent includes a built-in chapel. But no gift has as yet been received to pay for the girls' building and the Sister's chapel. They had to be built immediately, so it was necessary for the mission to go into debt. That debt has not yet been paid. Nor has the Sisters' chapel been dedicated under any particular title. The Sisters' chapel can be named in honor of Our Blessed Mother. Father Neate has also assured me that the girls' school will take the same name, for example if the chapel is named St. Mary's the girls' school can be called St. Mary's Hall, or if the chapel is named in honor of Our Blessed Mother's Assumption, the school can be named Assumption Hall.

If it is agreeable to you that I send your gift to Father Neate for the Sisters' convent at his mission, you might like to select the title yourself, and on receipt of your reply I will send your gift to Father Neate and inform him of the name you have selected. Father Neate will himself address a letter of thanks to you. He will also let the Sisters write you and thank you in their own name for your charity which will clear their chapel of debt and enable them to have it dedicated.

Dear Miss Gaupel:

I thank you for your letter of July 9 which reached me this morning. I will send this reply to you by special delivery, since you say you expect to leave St. Louis on the 15th.

It will be agreeable to me to receive the P. O. Bond, since you say it will be easier and quicker for you to send it than to sell it and send me a check for the proceeds.

I am notifying Father Neate today of your expected gift. When your letter came I had been wondering how I was going to answer a letter just received from him in which he pleads for help saying that his debt for the necessary buildings, including the Sisters' Chapel are crushing the life from him. I feel that your gift will give him new courage. Father Neate is a man far advanced in years, and I would like to make his declining years happier if I could help relieve him of his pressing debt. I am giving you these few details because I feel it will be a great consolation to you to know that your help will be sent where it is really most urgently needed.

I will ask Father Neate to select the name for the Sisters' Chapel and girls' school and to write a letter of thanks addressed to you informing you of the name they have selected. On receipt of this letter, I will forward it to you wherever you may be, if you will inform me of your address. Do you expect to remain in Santa Fe permanently or should the St. Louis address be kept on file?

untiring friend, as I can testify. Charles Curtis is one of God's noblemen.



Dear Monsignor:

I regret that we have no diocesan funds which I can divert to the help of the Indian Missions. I have received within the last couple of weeks no end of requests for help from various missionary enterprises. Really one cannot but feel that this whole thing of missionary support is in a very confused condition. It is simply impossible for a Bishop even to reply to all these petitions, much less to grant them. I have most pressing obligations of my own and of the diocese, for which I am obliged myself to solicit. The parishes, at least many of them, are heavily burdened with debt. So are the institutions of the diocese, and yet we are expected to be generous with all the missionary projects of this country and many outside of it.

I do not write this to censure or complain but merely to place before you the facts. What to do about it I am at a loss to say. Possibly the office of the Propagation of the Faith may be able to help you. Monsignor Glavin has been absent from the diocese for some time but is expected back for Christmas.

Dear Father Gilgan:

In order to prevent stealing of money from our mail, I believe that the Catholic institutions in Washington receiving considerable mail, should form a clearing house at least to the extent of notifying one another. The notification might best consist of a letter written at the time you write the post office inspector.

I assume that every time you find a suspicious looking envelope you forward it to the inspector in charge, Mr. W. J. Matherfield. For the past four years this Bureau has suffered only the most insignificant losses. I believe the reason is because I send every suspicious looking envelope to the inspector in charge. That gives him something to work on. I wrote on the front of the envelope all information, such as the hour received and the nature of the contents. In my letter of transmittal I call attention to any coincidences, such as the fact that all suspicious cases are coming from Chicago.

At present I have two letters of complaint, one from Chicago and the other from Mauvee, Illinois, stating that in October and November checks were sent to me for which no acknowledgments were received. The one from Chicago states that Extension Society also failed to acknowledge a check. Previous to these letters of complaint, day before yesterday I discovered two envelopes from Chicago that seemed to have been tampered with. I have today written Extension Society and have notified the inspector in charge who promises to write at once to the Chicago post office. WATCH YOUR CHICAGO MAIL. That one sentence would be enough notification for me in our clearing house.

I am writing also to Miss McKenna (Salve Regina), Fathers O'Hern and Havey (Bengalese) and Brother Anthony.
