The American Indian missions have good reason to count Your Eminence as the best of friends, both because of generous donations in the past and because of the directions given me by Your Eminence to write Your Eminence when in great need.

At this time I have to meet quarterly obligations for the mission schools, where there are seven thousand children mostly boarders, many of whom are orphans and nearly all dependent on charity.

The previous gifts of Your Eminence have been applied to St. John's Boarding School among the Pima Indians and the day schools among the Papago Indians, both in Arizona. The Pima and Papago children all know Cardinal O'Connell.
